The mystery was soon solved. Joseph Smith came into the Friends' Central Offices, 12, Bishopsgate Without, with a copy of the newspaper, and with some excitement exclaimed, "That is our old burial ground at Long Acre—John Whiting was buried there." The Surveyor for the district was communicated with, and very kindly gave his assistance and sanction for the removal of the bones. By subsequent order of the Six Weeks Meeting (the finance committee of London and Middlesex Quarterly Meeting) some 510 skulls and portions of other bones were removed and re-interred in the Friends' Burial Ground, Isleworth, and over them was placed a stone, with a suitable inscription, giving the history of the re-interment.9
